

## -40 Year Anniversary-

As winter is just around the corner, I thought I'd compare some of the blizzards of the century.

First up is the winter of 1977 and blizzard of January 1978. Research shows 1977 was colder and lasting much longer than normal but did not have the snow like we had on January 26, 1978. Worst blizzard on record with a tally of 40" of snow, wind gusts up to 55 mph, 10' – 20' drifts, wind chill - 50°. All cold weather and snow events were compared to 1936 at the time. In 1936 the issue was running out of coal due to not being able to get cars to the mines and few deliveries. By the 70's for home heat we had moved on to more convenient sources of heat. Even though 1978 might have had the worst weekend event and continuous cold for a month, we had ways of keeping warm and plowing snow they did not have in 1936.

Dad always talked about the house fire in January 1936. They took up residence afterwards at the Sun Set Lodge in one of those little shacks. You could never get warm, even sitting on one of those kerosene heaters. The homes were designed for overnight stays for travelers and definitely not cold weather. To top the winter off, 1936 was a drought year and went on to set heat records through the summer. So let's give 1936 the award for the most miserable year.

Back to the 1970's. We milked cows through all of these storms. Lots of times because the snow was so deep you could not spread the manure and snow on the fields, you started your morning off by clearing off a ½ acre or so just to have some place to push the snow. You could work at that for 3-4 hours before you ever began your regular chores. During some of the coldest and worst storms the cows wouldn't come out of the sheds to eat so the silage would freeze and you had to shovel all that out. There was also the tank heaters and calves being born. Then you begin the process of clearing roads and driveways. You are the county cleanup at that point. Hopefully you don't lose your lights; we have run a generator through these storms also at times. Can you see a pattern here as to why I don't miss the cows in the winter?

Did we have church? We sure did...

In 1977 the church was 1 month old; everybody wanted to enjoy the new church. And yet every weekend it stormed and/or snowed. In my archive of old bulletins, on January 16, 1977, the temperature at 8:30 AM was -20° with a wind chill of -72°, yet there were 197 present at church and 170 at Sunday school. The following Sunday, January 23<sup>rd</sup>, was the dedication of the church and I remember snow everywhere and still, worship had a count of 340 with Sunday school at 295, and a noon meal. The following Sunday, January 30, 1977, one more storm, the ole Brethren were becoming weary. Apparently it was coming down faster than possible to get rid of the snow, but 23 showed up and services were across the road at Pastor Don's house. Only the 2<sup>nd</sup> time, in 17 years, that we did not have church in the church on Sunday morning.

Through the years I have been involved in stacking snow, moving it off the parking lot. As these events will happen again, don't forget to thank the people that clear the snow before church, lately Dean Owens, Kendel Hattery, and even Phil Tomson on occasion, if I missed anyone, "Thank you!"

As December gets here, I want you to know I have the drudgery of having to pack and go to Florida for a month or so. I want you to know, lots of times when you all are cold up here; it gets chilly clear down in the bottom of Florida, too. -Historian, Glenn Conner
