May 2019 – 150 Years Ago

One of our major achievements was the joining of the East and West Coasts with a railroad. The Trans Continental Railroad came together in Utah, this very month 150 years ago.

Let's go back some 30 years before in Indiana. I know I've touched on this subject before; I picked up a book called Tales of the Old Days, with history pertaining to Wabash County and Manchester. The book gave you more insight to the problems of people wanting and needing a way to get from one place to another.

As settlers built their homes and developed their farms to produce grain, pork, etc. they needed a way to get it to market. At that time the Erie Canal was where one needed to go. If you could get your corn to a navigable river it was worth .50. There was no reason to grow any more corn than you ate or fed unless you could get it to market. I wonder how payment was made?

The answer –

The Plank Road - which I had never read or heard anything about.




The starting point was Manchester and they needed a road to Lagro, a port where they could merchandise their goods. You convinced the government you needed a road, they let contracts for maybe 5 mile sections and you bid the contract you were interested in. With no chainsaws, just crosscut saw and axes it states they did have saw mills where trees were made into 4 inch by 8 foot planks. The planks were laid together tight like a railroad track but without the space between. It states that it only took 2 horses to pull a wagon of goods on a plank road, and it took 4 horses on an unimproved road. Mom could be back home pulling stumps, plowing, or something with the other 2 horses. (That was not stated in the book.)

Canal History -

In 1823 the U.S. Congress authorized the state of Indiana to establish a canal, reserving 90 feet of land on each side to be used for canal purpose forever, and for no other purpose. Construction started February 22, 1832. The construction was done by Irish men with picks, shovels, and wheel barrows. The canal was gradually completed westward, and by July of 1843 had been opened to the Wabash River at a point where it was navigable. In this account the canal was used for about 30 years.

On January 20, 1856 the first train arrived in Wabash. By March 17, trains were running from Toledo to Logansport and by June as far as Lafayette. In the early 1870's, 15 years after the first train had passed over the railroad, the canal ceased to be operated as a state enterprise, though sections of it were used for local traffic for some time thereafter.

Another thing I learned, pilots of the canal boat had a bugle to blow when coming into port to let everyone know a boat was close by. The boat pilots usually owned their boat and the team of horses pulling the boat on the bank. Tolls were collected, by the number of horses, how that worked I'm not sure. 
Make this craft to show appreciation for your dad or another special man.
